Recent Insider Threats

SEC charged Denver based business man Scott Reiman with insider trading based on confidential information he obtained from the CEO of an oil and gas company that was about to secure a huge investment. Reiman agreed to pay nearly \$900,000 to settle the charges. (4/15/13)

SEC charged a California-based hedge fund analyst with insider trading in advance of a merger of two technology companies based on nonpublic information he received from an executive at one of the companies. The executive and another trader also were charged in the \$29 million scheme. (3/26/13)

Rajarengan "Rengan" Rajaratnam was charged by the SEC for his role in the massive insider trading scheme spearheaded by his older brother Raj Rajaratnam and hedge fund advisory firm Galleon Management. Rengan Rajaratnam reaped \$3 million in illicit gains. (3/21/13)
